

Breaking Bread

Dear Friends,

I love things that glow in the dark...the vast expanse of "interstellar space, galaxies, suns, the planets in their courses, and even this fragile earth, our island home (<u>BCP 370</u>)." Think about it, viewed from space even earth glows! The moonlight hitting fresh fallen snow, huge grids of electrical lights, candles and sometimes even fire and molten lava flowing are seen from heaven's perspective. God sees much more.

Bigfork's Young Life pastor, Brian, just returned from a world-wide Young Life Conference in Orlando, Florida. There were 5,000 in attendance. At one point each person was given fingertip wraps to wear on all ten fingers. The house lights were turned off. Everyone stood and raised their fingers upwards—they glowed in the dark. The miracle is this—each individual light represented over 300,000 youth who have received Christ through the mission of Young Life in the past 75 years!

When you and I put on Jesus Christ in baptism, we begin to glow in the darkness of the world. When we Episcopalians gather as a people of prayer to take the Good News of Jesus Christ to the world, we glow. We are a people engaged in mission. Did you know that the American Episcopal Church's name is officially "The Foreign and Domestic Missionary Society". Another way of saying this is, "We seek Christ and Make Christ Known." God sets our hearts on fire.

As the season of Light (Christmas-Epiphany) which marks the light of Jesus coming into the world comes to a close, I believe God sees many souls at St. Patrick's standing up for Jesus, glowing in the dark and making disciples.











God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit decide who is in 'communion' Anglican or otherwise. Christians are members one of another. There is great diversity even within our diocese and our small rural church. And there is great love and unity to carry the message of salvation out into the world.

I imagine you have heard about the Archbishops meeting at Canterbury two weeks ago and the ensuing "ruckus". So what response should we have to the Primates vote to inhibit the Episcopal Church from full participation in the Anglican Communion? We are a house of prayer for all people, so let us pray for the Worldwide Anglican communion: the third largest movement in Christianity on the planet. Pray for our new Presiding Bishop Michael Curry as he guides the Episcopal Church on the winding wondrous journey with Jesus. Pray for those in the church who are wounded and confused. Pray for more light.

> Come Holy Spirit and kindle the fire that is in us. Take our lips and speak through them. Take our souls and see through them. Take our hearts and set them on fire. Amen







Linda Edwards - Biography

Linda was born in Kansas (Beloit), raised in a little mountain community in Colorado (Idaho Springs), lived in western Colorado (Grand Junction) for 35 years before moving to Montana (Kalispell).

Calvary Episcopal Church in Idaho Springs, Colorado played a big part in her religious upbringing, being baptized in 1953; confirmed in 1959; and married in 1968 there. Shortly after moving into Grand Junction in 1978 she began attending St. Matthew's Episcopal Church (living 55 miles from Grand Junction for 3 years thus the wording of "into" Grand Junction). She started attending St. Patrick's once she moved into and settled in her home in Kalispell, around 2012.

For education, Linda has a Bachelors Degree from the University of Northern Colorado (1969) and a Masters in Business Administration from Western State College (1984). She met her husband while attending UNC, marrying in 1968. They have a son, Jason, who lives in Polson and he has four children – thus the reason for them moving to Montana. Linda and her husband are both retired and love being outdoors – fishing, camping, etc.

Linda had the luxury of gaining many skills in my 46 years of work experience starting as a waitress and ending as a Volunteer Coordinator for the Northwest Region with the Colorado Division of Wildlife. Between those two jobs, she has been a mail clerk, librarian clerk, cost accountant, computer operator, sales clerk, Trust operations supervisor, administrative clerk, secretary, typist, high school business teacher and college instructor. She learned a lot about customer service!

The most rewarding experience was working with the Division of Wildlife, learning from the biologists, officers, and other staff members about wildlife. Where else would you get the question "how do you feel about putting your hands in a bear's mouth?" Working with volunteers taught Linda quite a bit about herself as well as coordinating with others on that whole endeavor. . She states that she has had some great people in her work experiences plus a wonderful husband and son.
